





REACHING OUT

Our Reaching Out program serves around 4,000 girls per year. Reaching Out breaks down barriers and brings the benefits to Girl Scouts to all girls outside of a traditional troop setting. These positive, skill and character-building programs are possible with the support of GSNWGL staff, AmeriCorps members, interns, volunteers, and financial supporters. The counties Reaching Out serves are Adams, Brown, Calumet, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Outagamie, Portage, Vilas, Waupaca, Winnebago, and Wood. All curricula support the Girl Scout mission of building girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place.



Shine

A school collaborative program for girls in grades K-5. Shine is usually offered weekly for 8-12 sessions and takes place before school or during lunch recess, Girls learn about important topics through interactive games, crafts, and other activities. Shine offers a safe place for girls to make friends, try new things, and learn positive values in the presence of their peers.



Shine Like a Diamond (SLAD)

This collaborative program for girls in grades 4-6 seeks to unpack the issues facing girls in your school. From bullying to body image – Girl Scouts has a unique all-girl, girl-led philosophy and program that will help girls feel confident and advocate for themselves and others. Shine Like a Diamond is offered in small grade level groups of 12 and takes place during lunch and lunch recess. Through our collaboration we are able to identify specific topics that would be beneficial for girls and we invite school guidance counselors or social workers to attend sessions as they see fit.



Community Connect

A program specifically for girls ages 5-17 in partnership with other youth-serving organizations such as Boys and Girls Club, YMCA, and domestic abuse shelters. These programs typically take place during after school programs and summer programs. Through our collaborations, we are able to break down barriers that prevent girls from participating in Girl Scouts. Our curriculum veries depending on the girls we serve and the expressed needs or interests of the partner organization.

* Curriculum for both Shine and Community Connects includes topics like bullying, diversity, self-esteem, health and wellness, STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math), team building, and community service.

New Visions

A specially designed program for at-risk teens and tweens. Currently, New Visions takes place at juvenile detention centers, shelter care facilities, alternative schools, and residential treatment facilities. The curriculum varies depending on the needs and interests of the girls participating and topics requested by facility staff. Frequently-covered topics include healthy relationships, teen pregnancy, decision making, goal setting, career exploration, drug and alcohol abuse, self-esteem, music/media literacy, and community service. New Visions is typically offered on a weekly basis, it gives girls the opportunity to talk to caring, positive adult role models while learning to identify their own strengths through interactive, engaging girl-directed activities.
