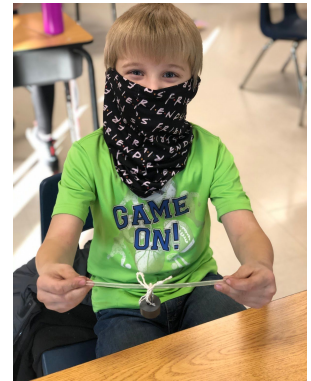
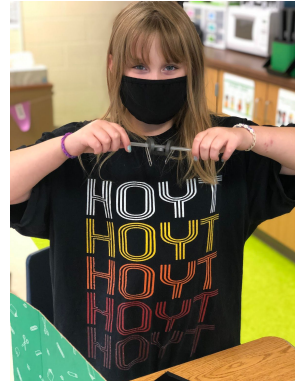
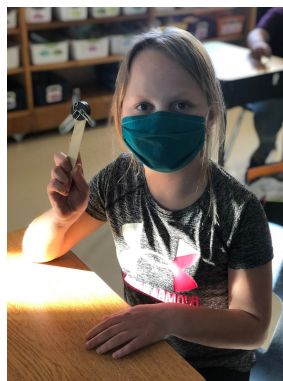

The Fourth Graders have been busy learning how to be great nonfiction readers and writers. In reading they are learning how to gather information on topics and people that interest them. In writing, they are learning how to write convincing opinion pieces by reviewing their favorite places to visit, restaurants, games, and more.

In math, the students were nervous about beginning multi-digit division, but now they are excited about learning different ways to divide multi-digit numbers. They are doing great with using the long division standard algorithm as well as using an area model to divide.

Sora holds all the digital books available in our libraries. The OpenDyslexic font makes letters more distinguishable and therefore easier for dyslexic students to identify, decode, decipher, and/or read. In Sora, you can turn on this font for any/all our books.



To change the text in [Sora](#) from the default text to the OpenDyslexic font, students will:

- Open an ebook.
- Navigate to the three-line, main "hamburger" menu.
- Tap "Reading Settings."
- Scroll to "Book Design" options.
- Tap "OpenDyslexic."
